THE HOUSE I LIVE IN

From the dealer to the narcotics officer, the inmate to the federal judge, a penetrating look inside America's criminal justice system, revealing the profound human rights implications of U.S. drug policy.

Thursday, June 4

CRIME AFTER CRIME

This documentary tells the dramatic story of the legal battle to free Debbie Peagler, an incarcerated survivor of domestic violence. She was wrongly convicted of the murder of her abusive boyfriend, and sentenced to 25 years to life in prison.

Wednesday, July 15

JUST US

Set in the Mission area of San Francisco, this film introduces a criminal and juvenile justice advocate and former teenage mother who spent many years in and out of jail, before co-founding a community group with the goal of helping at-risk youth avoid her mistakes.

Wednesday, August 19

ROAD TO RETURN

The story of a black ex-bank robber and a white college professor who unite to create the nation's leading aftercare program, helping ex-cons return not to crime but to society as productive citizens.

Tuesday, September 8

THE THROWAWAYS

A personal exploration of the devastating impact of police brutality and mass incarceration on the black community told through the eyes of formerly incarcerated activist filmmaker Ira McKinley.

Wednesday, October 14

GIRL TROUBLE

An intimate look at the compelling personal stories of three teenagers entangled in San Francisco's juvenile justice system. These girls, and many like them, aren't just at-risk, they are in deep trouble.
